









Matthie, 2022 arcylic & metal paint on canvas 48 x 36 inches 122 x 91 cm

Malibu (for Vandervoort), 2001 acrylic on canvas 48 x 36 inches 122 x 91 cm







Giottus, 2021




Varnedoe, 2021 acrylic & metal paint on wood 36 x 36 inches 91 x 91 cm




Untitled, 2021 metal paint on canvas 60 x 48 inches 152 x 122 cm






Rara Avis, 2021 acrylic & metal paint on canvas 122 x 36 inches 122 x 91 cm





Resoriation, 2021 acrylic on canvas 48 x 36 inches 122 x 91 cm






Lucretzia, 2021 acrylic & pumice on canvas 48 x 36 inches 122 x 91 cm










Untitled, 2022 acrylic on sintra 48 x 36 inches 122 x 91 cm






Midori, 2022 acrylic & metal paint on wood 36 x 36 inches 91 x 91 cm
